



BEST WALKS IN CALGARY

From Lori Beattie's "Calgary's Best Walks"

Ann and Sandy Cross Conservation Area

This "prairie paradise" consists of rolling foothills covered in a bed of grasses and aspen forests - a real Albertan heaven! This walk starts at 160 Street W, Calgary, and each visitor must visit the ASCCA kiosk upon arrival to pay the visitor fee. This 7.4km trail has moderate difficulty with hills and inclines, but walkers can choose their distance and difficulty level based on different interconnecting trails.

Please note that this is a conservation area, not a park. Visitors are asked to book their hikes in advanced at https://www.crossconservation.org/ and pay for parking. Be sure to bring enough food and water for your walk and be prepared to pack your garbage with you when you leave. Dogs, bicycles, and strollers are not allowed.

Fish Creek Park - Bow Valley Ranch

The Bow Valley Ranch route is an open-prairie grassland walk with climbs up to a mountain view. This walk starts at the Bow Valley Ranch parking area in Fish Cree Park. This 8km walk has a combination of flats and hills, labeling it with moderate difficulty. You'll begin the walk with a stroll past the Artisan Gardens and Annie's Café before climbing up to the Parkland community. When you look out to the distance, you'll be able to see Fish Creek Park below and the Rockies out in the distance. This walk is free for visitors and has year-round bathrooms as well as the Annie's Café if you need a bite to eat.

LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT SIGNS FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

In 2022, 25 land acknowledgment signs were installed in parks and open spaces across Calgary with the intent of building awareness of the original stewards of the land and to contribute to the ongoing Truth and Reconciliation process.

Calgary Parks & Open Spaces worked together with Calgary's Aboriginal Urban Affairs Committee and Calgary's Indigenous Relations Office on the development of the land acknowledgment text that was supported by all representatives of Treaty 7 Nations and the Métis Nation. Treaty 7 was signed on September 22, 1877 at Blackfoot Crossing and the signatories to this peace treaty include the Blackfoot Confederacy Nations (Kainai, Piikani and Siksika First Nations)*, the Îethka Nakoda Nations (Bearspaw, Chiniki and Wesley First Nations) and the Tsuut'ina First Nation. To ensure respect, we also recognize this land as the homeland of the Historic Northwest Métis and specifically the Métis Nation of Alberta Region 3 (MNAR3).

Initially, these signs were created to add to the experience and appreciation of Calgary's parks. However, they have since moved beyond a modest contribution to the public realm with the larger goal of contributing to specific Calls to Action that came from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (2015). The signs not only represent the truth, but they also identify the original stewards of the land, highlighting that it was colonization and the Treaty process that limited the ability of the First Peoples to continue to steward the land. The signs are found primarily within natural area parks and are located relatively close to the entries. Great care was given to the placement of the signs, ensuring the landscape acted as an integrated backdrop and almost became part of the signage. The hope is that as a visitor starts their journey through the park, they will acknowledge the original stewards of the land and reflect on what that means to themselves, their friends, families and to our larger society.

Through personalized ceremony and cultural protocols with Treaty 7 and MNAR3 Elders and Knowledge keepers, the project received a spiritual blessing at sign locations across the city and from each of the 8 Nations (please note not all Elders feel comfortable with photographs). These ceremonies will connect the signs to the land, the air and the water that surrounds them. The significance of these meaningful experiences cannot be fully expressed, but the importance and appreciation of these landscapes is clearly understood. The hope is that visitors feel those good intentions, even if they are not fully aware of them.





CITY OF CALGARY TRAFFIC SERVICE REQUEST



The Residential Traffic Safety Unit (RTSU) is a unit created to specifically address residential traffic issues. Our strategy is to utilize citizen feedback to develop our operational response. We focus on playground zones, pedestrian rich areas and other high-risk locations identified through collision data analysis. The RTSU is attached to the Traffic Section of the Calgary Police Service.

We strongly emphasize public awareness and education, facilitating citizen engagement by attending Community Association Board meetings to discuss the Traffic Service Request System (TSR). The TSR is a key tool to help Calgary Police Service monitor and track traffic safety issues. The RTSU also utilizes strong collaborative relationships with City partners on traffic concerns requiring resolutions other than enforcement (sign changes, installation of crosswalks, Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons, extension of playground zones etc.)

Millican Ogden History Snippets From a Senior - Part 5

This is the final installment of an article written by Keith Moss, the grandson of George Moss, after whom George Moss Park is named. George and his wife, Edith, settled in Ogden in 1913 when he obtained a job as a machinist at the C.P.R. Ogden Shops. George was a member of St. Augustine's Church, was the secretary of the Ogden Community Association for 32 years, and was a Charter Member of the Ogden Legion. The park is named after him for his dedicated service to his community.

The street cars made their loop and headed back to the city centre at the same intersection. This was the last street car stop, so if you needed to get into downtown Calgary you had to walk from home to the loop at 74 Avenue and 24 Street. A street car ride took about an hour one way. I remember two exciting instances on the street car. One was just at the top of the 9th Avenue underpass in East Calgary beside Terrill Florist. There, the conductor had to stop the streetcar and with a metal shafted tool that he had to shove through the opening in the floor of the street car, he had to switch the track so it could proceed on the Ogden line and not continue on to East Calgary. Once that hair rising task was completed we journeyed on and the street car struggled to get over the Alyth Bridge near the stock yards.

Ogden didn't have very many Community Services but we did have fire and police protection. The Fire Hall was a dark green single story building located about one block west of the current service station at the base of the hill just before climbing into Lynnwood. Our police protection was provided by a single policeman, Bill Morrison. Bill lived two doors north of Cable's store on 24th street. I remember him as being a huge man with a deep burly voice and a British accent. He had no patrol car bur walked everywhere on foot. His size and demeanour assured me that if a crime was committed, and the perpetrator was caught. Bill would deal with it effectively and efficiently.

In conclusion, I would like to share my thoughts on the educational services that Ogden residents received. I attended Elementary School in Ogden It served

students from Grades 1 to 6. For Junior High school I had to catch a special bus on 24th Street. In Junior High we were taken to Colonel Walker School in East Calgary and for High School I went to Western Canada High. One principal and a couple of teachers stand out in my mind. One of the Principals at Ogden was Mr Coffin. He was the best marble player I had ever seen. He took on all and Sundry in a no –holds barred marble competition. I lost many tiger eye or steely marble to him. He also encouraged us to play outside in good weather or bad. Even in the winter he would be outside playing volleyball. Another elementary teacher that I remember was Miss Bruce. She and her sister lived together on the South Hill. We students made their house a prime destination at Halloween because they handed out Hot Dogs on that night. The other teacher that left me with memories was Ms Pedersen who later became Mrs. Sawkins. Her dedication impressed me. No matter what the season, she walked to school from 18th street in Millican to the Ogden School. There were no houses on her journey...she walked across the pasture for approximately three quarters of a mile regardless of the weather. In the winter that woman knew how to layer! One time in the spring a bull chased her out of the pasture, but she soldiered on and made it to school before the bell rang.

I hope that you could read between the lines and realize that my enthusiasm and moral support for Ogden has not waned. It was a great community to grow up in. I hope that each of you is enjoying the community as much as I did and in the distant future, you will be able to reflect on the imprint that Ogden has made on your life.
