In closing we had a busy year last year and our reward for that is an even busier year this year. I look forward to seeing you all at the meetings this year.






City of Calgary Police Youth Connection Dance:

The dance was an extreme success with a DJ, pizza and beverages, and prizes for all 120 students in attendance – all thanks to the City of Calgary Police. Truly a very memorable event for the participating students especially for those who also visited the City of Calgary Police Command Unit which remained stationed outside the hall throughout the evening.

Christmas Hampers: The SE CCRC'S Christmas Craft Sale was once again very successful. 



Millican Ogden History

Snippets From a Senior - Part 4

Once again, the Millican Ogden Heritage Group continues an article written by Keith Moss, a grandson of George Moss, after whom George Moss Park is named. George and his wife, Edith, settled in Ogden in 1913 when he obtained a job as a machinist at the C.P.R. Ogden Shops. George was a member of St. Augustine's Church, was the secretary of the Ogden Community Association for 32 years, and was a Charter Member of the Ogden Legion. The park is named after him for his dedicated service to his community.

The late 1940's was another memorable time for the Moss family on 22nd Street. In 1948, my brother Wayne was born. It always amazes me that 8 year' difference in age could make such a difference to a young man's growth and development in the Ogden Community.

About the same time that my brother blessed our home, we received a telephone. We didn't have one before then. Before the late 40's, if we wanted to make a phone call, family members had to go to my Grandma and Granddad Moss' home. It was only a quick walk through an empty lot to reach their back gate. (They lived on 22A Street.) The only problem was my Grandparents had 23 other people on a party line so it took some time to make a call! When we got our first phone installed, we had to share the line with one other party but we didn't wait too long until we had our own private line.

A TV was the other electronic gadget that was missing in our home. Like many families in Ogden we didn't get a TV until the mid to late 1950's. Prior to that, our family spent time being entertained by the radio. Every morning my Mom would do here housework while listening to the "Happy Gang" a program out of Toronto. In the afternoon there was a full complement of Soap Operas.

In the evening, members of my family and me would listen to a variety of programs. My Dad and I loved to listen to "The Green Hornet", the "Cisco Kid", the "Lone Ranger", and a mystery called "The Shadow Knows." Everyone would enjoy the comedies, like Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, Ozzie and Harriet, and Wayne and Schuster. The Calgary Herald always had a section of colored comics in each Saturday's edition and at 9am on Sunday mornings, my sister and I would sit near the radio with the comic section in hand and listen for an hour while a man read the comics over the air. He had a knack of making them come to life thus stimulating our imaginations.

Our house was very comfortable with basic necessities. The one appliance that I would say was unique by today's standards was a 4.5 to 5 cubic foot Servel fridge that ran on natural gas. We initially had no deep freeze.

Because storage of fresh fruit and meats was limited at home and because until the early 50's we had no car, we, like many Ogden citizens, shopped locally. There were only two stores in our community. Both of them sat across from each other on 26 Street and 76th Avenue. Cables, owned by Len Cable and his father was a cream colored building with living quarters in the back and sat on the north west corner of 26 Street and 76 Avenue and the other store, a blue grey building was owned by the Featherstone family and sat on the south-west corner across from Cable's store. Mr. Cable and Len had a brown draught horse which they tethered on the open land behind the store. (There were only two residences between their store and the corner of George Moss Park.) Phones were limited so most people would walk to the store. If the groceries were too much to carry back home, the Cables would deliver them every Saturday afternoon using the horse and covered wagon that looked much like a stage coach.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR MLA, TANYA FIR

Dear Constituents,

Affordability is a challenge facing many Albertans right now. That is why we are delivering timely and meaningful support. It will include improving the Bow Bottom Trail and Anderson Road, Southland Drive and Glenmore Trail interchanges; building seven new bridge structures at Anderson Road and Bow Bottom Trail, Bow River, Southland Drive and Glenmore Trail; and, adding more lanes to Deerfoot Trail along the highway and through the Anderson Road/Bow Bottom Trail and Glenmore Trail interchanges.

Patients receiving cancer care in Calgary are another step closer to receiving that care in a world-class medical centre. The new Calgary Cancer Centre will increase care capacity by consolidating and expanding existing services to support integrated and comprehensive cancer care. The hospital will serve as a hub for medical education and research activities, providing jobs and educational opportunities for Albertans. AHS is preparing the hospital for clinical services, including installing equipment and

furniture, and training staff. Once operational, the 186,000 square metre facility will have 160 inpatient beds, 100 patient exam rooms and will provide a wide range of health-care services for patients.




